Sermon Follow-up | October 6, 2019

The Torah — The Exodus Focus Passage: Exodus 1:8-10, 2:23-3:14 Additional Context: Exodus 1–14 Other Passages Referenced: Matt 2:14–15; John 1:29; 19:14–16 Corollary Scripture – Psalm 106:1-12 & Psalm 114

Sermon Recap: God's intervention is powerful, present, and personal. The plagues show God's power over all aspects of life —social, economic, religious, and political. God's intervention becomes an invitation to Moses but Moses resisted the invitation by giving five excuses. We need to stop resisting and making excuses and start remembering how God has faithfully intervened in the past.

Comments to those in a Small Group

- Our E100 reading plan currently has us substantially behind the passages being covered in the Sunday sermons, although, by the end of our 8-week *Fall Chapel-wide Study* the sermon and our final week's stories will both address roughly the same period—the time when the Israelites were ready to enter the Promised Land with Joshua as their human leader. Our reading plan devotes five stories to the Joseph narrative recorded in Genesis 37–50. Last week's sermon addressed all of those chapters in one-fell swoop to keep us on track for our overview of the entire Bible in one year. This Sunday's sermon went through the Exodus, which we won't get to in our reading plan until two weeks from now. The stories you are reading provide integral information for the sermons you are hearing. I encourage you to look for the threads running between readings and sermons that demonstrate *creation, rebellion, redemption, and new creation* with Jesus at the center. Also consider what it actually looks like to *live by* and *let others* know what we're *listening to* and *learning from* God's word.
- A quick review of pages 16–17 of the *Study Guide* may be helpful as you prepare for your group's discussion. Be prepared to give a summary of the stories in your own words. Also be ready to share what you are learning along with a specific action that will train you to live by and let others know about God's word.

- 9. Are there any commands in the passages we need to obey?
