



Jesus teaches: replace your condemning or condoning attitude with a Kingdom attitude



"Matthew 7:1-5 does not call for the obliteration of moral distinctions. Jesus does not make each person a law to himself or herself, nor does he encourage the attitude that no one should be concerned to identify the moral failures of other members of the community and help them to overcome them.

Even the act of forgiveness presupposes that one recognizes that another has done wrong; forgiveness entails a kind of judgement. Community discipline, involving judgement and forgiveness, may be an expression of the deepest love, while not judging the other by simply leaving him or her alone may be an easy way out that betrays authentic Christian love." — Leander Keck
