The Psalms are a sign, pointing us toward Biblical Worship.

Biblical Worship (A Definition):

- 1) Prioritizes God.
- 2) Integrates worship and life.
- 3) Ultimately points to Jesus Christ.

Psalms of Remembrance ... teach us to remember God's redemptive acts, His covenant promises, and His faithfulness (Psalms 89 and 77).

Psalms of Wisdom... teach us to seek His wisdom and His ways and not those of the world (Psalms 1 and 119).

Psalms of Confidence ... teach us to rest in God's presence, rely on God's protection, remember God's promises, and ultimately to find our confidence in Jesus Christ (Psalms 91 and 23).

Psalms of Lament ... are an invitation to ordered, congregational authenticity in the face of our sorrows, whereby we see Jesus in our suffering (Psalms 22 and 88).

Psalms of Praise ... teach us that biblical worship is not a feeling we chase, but a discipline we embrace (Psalms 19 and 150).

The Structure of the Psalms – Five Books: Book 1: Psalms 1-41 Blessed be the Lord, the God of Israel, from everlasting to everlasting! Amen and Amen.

Psalms 41:13

The Structure of the Psalms – Five Books: Book 2: Psalms 42-72 ¹⁸Blessed be the Lord, the God of Israel, who alone does wondrous things. ¹⁹Blessed be his glorious name forever; may the whole earth be filled with his glory! Amen and Amen!

Psalms 72:18-19

The Structure of the Psalms – Five Books: Book 3: Psalms 73-89
Blessed be the Lord forever!
Amen and Amen.

Psalms 89:52

The Structure of the Psalms – Five Books: Book 4: Psalms 90-106 Blessed be the Lord, the God of Israel, from everlasting to everlasting! And let all the people say, "Amen!" Praise the Lord!

Psalms 106:48

The Structure of the Psalms – Five Books: Book 5: Psalms 107-150 146-150 (The "Hallelujah" Psalms) Hallelujah = "Praise the Lord!"

1. Call to Worship (150:1) The WHAT and WHO of Worship

Praise = "to shine forth light, to boast in something or someone"
