"Here's why the line is so important: We all know Jesus died. The line about his descent to hell says yet more still—it shows us just how far he is willing to go. Christ didn't just dip his toe in the cold waters of death and say, 'Oh, you're right, that really is unfortunate; I feel very sorry for all you human types, really I do.'

No, Jesus went the whole way: he was put to death as a criminal, buried by others in a borrowed tomb, was truly dead—for three days. There's no coming back from that. into the deepest recesses of the earth, like Ephesians says, or all the way to hell, as the Creed says. Why? Why would Jesus do that?

Listen to this: There's no place God will not go to find even one lost sheep. There's no place God cannot reach to reclaim God's very own.

That's what 'he descended to the dead' means. That's why it matters. That's why we should say it. Never censor it."

Some reflections on Maundy Thursday:

The meaning of communion and what the Apostle Paul meant when he called the church, "the household of God," deepened significantly for me last night. I saw husbands serving wives and wives serving husbands. A Dad knelt to receive from his son.

I had a front row seat to witness a mom and an adult child weeping as they reconnected. A man hobbled up on crutches only to throw them down in exchange for a grip on Jesus' table to keep him standing. When it looked like my hands were full someone even reached in to gently cover the cup of Christ for me after the group had been served.

Several times the person standing next to me looked surprised when they realized they were in position to serve one of their pastors. They asked me if I was going to receive from them. My joyful response was always, "Of course I'm going to receive from you!" We needed the same Savior, and have been made brothers and sisters in Christ.

When it was all over, my Bible was covered with crumbs. A beautiful reminder that before His death Jesus did not give His disciples a theory to explain their faith but a meal to share with all who have placed their faith in Him.
